Lillian Eleanor Butler, 89, passed away peacefully at home on August 16, 2024. She was born March 12, 1935, in Morganton, NC. to the late Charles Ayden Butler Sr. and Lillian Warner Butler. She was preceded in death by her brother, Charles Ayden Butler Jr. of Newland and her nephew, Charles Ayden Butler III of Hickory.

Eleanor attended Morganton High School, Greensboro Women's College, and she obtained her master's degree in education at Appalachian State University. She walked the campuses using crutches and she never let polio slow her down. Eleanor was a member of First United Methodist Church of Morganton, and she was active in many organizations in Burke County. Eleanor worked for BCPS and went on to work at Broughton Hospital as personnel director, she eventually retired at JIRDC. She was a member of the Burke County School Board from 1981 until 1989, serving as chairman 1987 & 1988. Eleanor was also honored as Burke County's Woman of the Year in 1989.
